K: my friends encouraged me because they thought that I would be a good leader and it feels good that they recognised this and I really glad to represent them.


S: I wanted to go for head boy because over the past few years in school I've gained great relationships with both staff and pupils so I decided that it would be great to lead them all into their final year.

Covid procedures

As we continue to live with the pandemic, school has adjusted to ensure that we all keep safe in the building.



ENTERING THE SCHOOL

All pupils enter the school via the Assembly Hall doors in the rear playground. They are met by Deputes and PT Pupil Support teachers who remind pupils to wear masks and sanitise hands.

KEEPING CLEAN

Hand sanitising stations are located around the school buildings especially at the entry doors.

When entering classrooms, pupils sanitise their hands to make sure everyone is kept safe.

Equipment is sanitised at the start and end of lessons by pupils, anywhere they have touched especially computers, chairs, desks and work stations.

MASK WEARING

Government guidance continues to advise that pupils and staff wear masks in communal areas. This is important in the corridors where it can get very busy at class changeover time. In classrooms masks should also be worn.

EXTRA PRECAUTIONS

In classrooms all of the desks are facing forward so there is no need for any communication with the people behind you unless the teacher asks you to.

Pupils are reminded to bring their own supplies to class (pens/pencils etc) to minimize sharing resources and spreading germs.

TESTING

Pupils and staff are reminded to test twice weekly and to self-isolate if they have a positive result until such times as they have a PCR test. If this is negative, pupils and staff can return to school. If positive, they must isolate for 10 days.

NOTE – this guidance may change according to government announcements and is correct at time of writing (start of December 2021).






Digital Ambassadors

Feature: Getting the most out of your iPaa

All young people have now been issued with their own personal iPad, and this has made a huge difference to learning and teaching in school and at home. Digital Learning is a key feature of our School Improvement Plan and we hope that all our young people use their iPads responsibly. Here are some top tips to help everyone get the best out of them.

Working with your Ipad

- Keep iPad clean.
- ⇒ Keep iPad dry and away from water.
- ⇒ Keep the cover on to protect it.
- ⇒ Charge iPads before coming to school.
- Update iOS software and apps regularly.
- ⇒ Don't lend your iPad to anyone.
- ⇒ Make a secure passcode.
- ⇒ Personalise your lock screen to stop it getting mixed up with others.
- ⇒ Follow teacher instructions for using your iPad in class, **only use it in** class for the directed tasks.



Top tips / Trouble-shooting

- Use your One Drive, organise it into folders for each subject.
- You need to remain logged into Glow/One Drive for the Microsoft and Satchel One apps to work.
- Proxy Authentication you may need to enter your GSN ID (school computer login and password) at some points – so the Ipad is linked to the school network, and knows you. If you bypass Proxy, then you will not be able to access the internet.
- If apps don't work, if your software is up to-date, have checked you are logged into glow and you can access the internet-then try switching off and on again. DO NOT DO THIS IF YOU HAVE FOR-GOTTEN YOUR PASSCODE - this will block your lpad and cannot be fixed in school.
- If you do forget your 6-digit passcode, check the photo you took with your info.
- If your iPad is disabled, see Mrs Lynch to have your passcode reset.
- For all other issues, see the teacher responsible for your class to report faults/problems.


















Feature: Home Economics


